<i>You said...</i>	<i>Your Neighbourhood Team did...</i>
<p>Safety Spondon Precinct Chapel Side What is being done to tackle Anti Social Behaviour. What impact does the mosquito have?</p>	<p>Police continue to maintain this location as a priority for patrols including the use of the Community Watch Patrol van, which is fitted with cctv. When the Mosquito was installed there were fewer incidents of young people gathering. The Police report a continued reduction in number of calls for service during April and May.</p>
<p>Safety Brunswood Park – What is being done to tackle Anti Social Behaviour?</p>	<p>A mixture of both positive activities and enforcement are taking place on Brunswood Park. Sporting Futures are organising sporting sessions on the park on a Friday from 6.30 to 8pm. Growing numbers of young people are engaging in positive activities. Meanwhile the Police continue to prioritise the park for patrols. Operation Wasted run to tackle underage drinking. The Community Watch Patrol van, fitted with cctv visits the park regularly. The Crime Prevention Team has visited to identify potential improvements to the park that will reduce the likelihood of incidents of anti social behaviour especially around the play area. Derby Parks has confirmed that the play area is due for refurbishment in 2010/11. Number of calls for service to the Police have reduced in May.</p>
<p>Safety What can be done to make Borrowwash Road safer for Asterdale School parents and children to cross .Can the zig zag lines be extended</p>	<p>Council Cabinet has approved funding to start investigations in 2009/10 as part of the Highways and Transport programme.</p>
<p>Highways What is being done in Chapel Street to tackle the problems with Traffic and Parking? One view was the parking spaces on Chapel Lane is a retrograde step.</p>	<p>Work now completed to introduce a local residents only parking scheme, limit waiting time to one hour from 8am to 6pm near to the shops on Chapel Street. Also relocate some bus stops. There have been more positive comments than negative ones about the chicane style parking. The work done at the school gates has been very well received. The impact to be reviewed and evaluated and reported to the Board in 2009/10.</p>
<p>Highways What is the outcome of the request for action to be taken on Locko Road and Dale Road to combat speeding?</p>	<p>Council Cabinet has approved funding in 2009/10 as part of the Highways and Transport programme to install a Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS) on Dale Road only. Impact will be reviewed and reported back to the Board</p>
<p>Highways What can be done about moving the road sign on Hall Dyke that makes it easier to access to St Werburghs school playing fields</p>	<p>Highways Inspector has visited the site and recommended that the sign is moved to prevent it being used as a foothold. The school has given permission for the sign to be fixed to its property.</p>

<p>Highways What action is being taken to respond to the Governments campaign to have speed limits reviewed?</p>	<p>Council Cabinet has approved funding in 2009/10 for the production of a speed management policy in response to the Governments announcement. The Council waiting further guidance from the Government about its proposals.</p>
<p>Community What is being done to fill the empty shops like the Coop?</p>	<p>Spondon Traders Association is aware of the empty shops and keen to reduce them. They are working to include the landlords of some shops. Some decisions are the landlords responsibility.</p>
<p>Parks The Village Improvement Committee has completed a review of parks in Spondon in 2008. They noticed an excellent new play facility built at Sunnyhill Recreation ground. What percentage of funds available to support parks is spent in Spondon ward compared to other wards?</p>	<p>Councillor Williams responded that she would investigate to see if the details were available and would report back – awaiting a response from Parks.</p> <p>Borrowood Park Play area is one of 8 play areas in the city that have been agreed to receive playbuilder funding this year 2009/10.</p> <p>The years programme has not yet been finalised but Borrowood will be one of the last 4 to be done.</p> <p>More details will be provided as the programme develops.</p>
<p>Housing Outline planning permission in 2006 contained a condition that detailed application would be made in 3 years:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. When will the detailed application be submitted? 2. Why has it taken so long when there is such a need for social housing? 3. Will the detailed reserve matters on the application be subject to public consultation? If so when? 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. In April it was confirmed that a detailed application is due to be submitted within the next few months. 2. However, as the Craddock Avenue development is part of a larger PFI scheme it is dependant on work progressing on all of the development sites. One of the sites currently needs an updated flood risk assessment approved by the Environment Agency. With a PFI scheme the detail is all worked out before hand such as design, property types, materials, standards, specification, so that when contracts are signed the planning application can be submitted straight away. This ensures that we have a contract that is ready to start as soon as planning is agreed. On other schemes we sign the partner up and then agree everything afterwards. This can mean that we don't always achieve the outcome we would like – with the PFI we know exactly what we're getting. 3. Once the preferred partner is agreed they are likely to carry out public consultation but there will also be the standard consultation as part of the planning application. More detailed information on timescales will be provided as it comes available

New Dentists for Derby

Three new dentists were opened in Derby earlier this year – in Mackworth, Sinfin and Alvaston. Following a very successful implementation, NHS Derby City is now planning to begin a further piece of work to commission three additional dental services.

Tenders are currently being sought to provide NHS dental services in the Derby city centre, Darley Abbey and Spondon/Chaddesden areas. The deadline for tender submissions is Friday 5th June and it is hoped these new dental services will be available from 1st November this year.

PCT Projects Nominated for Health and Social Care Awards

NHS Derby City is delighted to announce that two projects by members of our staff have been shortlisted for the Health and Social Care Awards.

Nishi Madan, Public Health Strategy Manager for the Trust, helped coordinate a play that raised awareness about diabetes last year, and it has reached the top three in the category of Improving Health and Reducing Inequalities.

Meanwhile, the Community Dialogue Project has reached the top three in the category of Leadership for Improvement, which recognises great leadership approaches that can demonstrate positive and sustained impact on patients, service users and staff.

Business as usual at the NHS Walk-in Centre

Accident and Emergency (A&E) is at the City Hospital at 2am on Wednesday 20 May 2009, but the NHS Walk-in Centre remains on the site of the DRI, off Osmaston Road. Experienced NHS nurses provide treatment at the NHS Walk-in Centre for minor injuries and everyday illnesses, such as colds, flu, ear infections, minor cuts and bruises, muscle and joint injuries and rashes. They also give advice about non-urgent conditions. The NHS Walk-in Centre is open from 8am to 7.30pm, every day including weekends and holidays.

A&E doctors and nurses are equipped to deal with serious medical emergencies, such as heavy blood loss, chest pain and broken bones. Unless you need emergency medical attention, it is best not to go to A&E.

Fresh Start Help Derby Couple Win Competition

Fresh Start has helped a couple from Derby to win a national competition to quit smoking, held by the Daily Mirror.

Gill and Terry Stapleton were smoking 40 a day between them when they entered the competition to win £2,000 of holiday vouchers as part of National Stub It Out Week

From the entries they received, the Daily Mirror chose five teams from around the country and focussed on their attempts to give up smoking. Each team submitted information about themselves as well as a blog which showed their progression.

Gill and Terry received support from Fresh Start, Derby's stop smoking service, to give up and Smoking Adviser Su Benton is mentioned on several entries on Gill's blog.

They were formally announced as the winners of the competition on 1 April.

NHS Derby City Successfully Pilots iNurse

District nurses in Derby city have recently been spending more time nursing and less time writing notes, thanks to the pilot of a new, handheld mobile device for management and communication called iNurse.

Each district nurse is given one of the devices, which can be used by the sister to manage team workload (including new referrals) and allocate visits to individual nurses. The nurses can then confirm receipt of their visits electronically, visit the patients and record the outcome of each visit on their device. The data is then sent from the device to the central iNurse database that holds all information about episodes of patient care. Once transmitted, no data is left on the handheld device ensuring data security and patient confidentiality.

For the first time, community nursing can be free of manual processes that have held nursing back for so long. Initial calculations indicate that NHS Derby City could free up over 15,000 hours of district nursing time per year when iNurse is rolled out across the whole service.

New Director of Strategy and Market Management

NHS Derby City's new Director of the new Strategy and Market Management directorate, Angus Maitland, will be starting on 1st June 2009.

Mr Maitland begins his post on 1st June 2009, from his current post as Director of Operations at University Hospitals of Leicester NHS Trust, where he has worked since 2002. He has spent the last two-and-a-half years as Director of Operations, where he has been accountable for the delivery of all clinical services. He has worked in the NHS for 15 years in total.
